Murray N. Rothbard, professor of economics at the Polytechnic Institute of Brooklyn, is the editor of *Libertarian Forum* and the author of *Man, Economy and State; America's Great Depression; Power and Market* as well as numerous articles. "Freedom, Inequality, Primitivism and the Division of Labor" was originally presented at the Symposium on Human Differentiation, held in August 1970 at the Institute of Paper Chemistry in Appleton, Wisconsin, and sponsored by the Institute for Humane Studies.

Henry Hazlitt, one of the nation's foremost journalists in the field of economics and politics, was until recently a nationally syndicated columnist for the Los Angeles Times Syndicate. He is the author of a dozen books which have spanned such diverse fields as literary criticism, philosophy, ethics, politics and economics. His article, "The Future of Capitalism" is also appearing in the *Festschrift* for Ludwig von Mises, put out by the Institute for Humane Studies, on the occasion of Prof. von Mises' 90th birthday.

Stephen J. Tonsor is professor of European intellectual history at the University of Michigan. He has published widely in both scholarly and popular journals. Recently his research has been in the field of youth movements, educational theory and ideas of decadence and rejuvenation.

E. M. Adams is Kenan Professor of Philosophy at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and the author of *Ethical Nationalism and the Modern World-View* and *Commonsense Realism* as well as a number of other books and numerous articles.

Leo R. Ward is professor emeritus of philosophy at Notre Dame University and the author of many works on social philosophy and regional literature.
