

*Gerhart Niemeyer* is professor of political science at the University of Notre Dame and associate editor of *Modern Age*. He is the author of numerous articles and books, amongst which are *Between Nothingness and Paradise* and *Deceitful Peace*.

*Stephen J. Tonsor*, professor of European intellectual history at the University of Michigan, is the author of *Tradition and Reform in Education*. He has published widely in both scholarly and popular journals and is regarded nationally as a principal spokesman of conservatism.
