

NOTES ON CONTRIBUTORS

Andrew Lytle, long time distinguished editor of the *Sewanee Review* and professor of English at the University of the South and Vanderbilt, has been prominent in American Letters for some fifty years. Writer, novelist, poet, and stylist, he is the surviving leader with Robert Penn Warren and Lyle Lanier of the Southern Agrarian movement. He now resides in retirement in Monteagle, Tennessee. This article and that of Marion Montgomery are based on papers presented to the Philadelphia Society meeting held in New Orleans in October 1979, on "The South and American Conservatism."

Marion Montgomery is professor of English at the University of Georgia. His latest book, *Why Flannery O'Connor Stayed Home*, the first of a three-volume study of the prophetic poet and the popular spirit, is due out from Sherwood Sugden & Company later this year.

Stephen J. Tonsor, professor of intellectual history at the University of Michigan, is the author of *Tradition and Reform in Education*. He has published widely in both scholarly and popular journals and is regarded nationally as a principal spokesman of conservatism. Currently he is resident scholar at the American Enterprise Institute.

Arthur Shenfield, British economist, writer, and barrister-at-law, has been regents' professor of economics at the University of California and visiting professor of economics at the University of Dallas; in 1978 he was visiting professor at the University of San Diego Law School. He resides in Old Windsor, Berkshire.

Paul Gottfried, professor of history at Rockford College, will shortly publish *Conservative Millenarians* with Fordham University Press. He is co-editor-in-chief of *Continuity*, a conservative historical journal scheduled to appear for the first time in March of 1981.

William C. Dennis is professor of history at Denison University where he lectures on early American history and the history of conservatism.

E. C. Pasour, Jr. is professor of economics and business at North Carolina State University. His articles have appeared in economic journals and, among others, in *The Intercollegiate Review*, *Reason*, and *The Journal of Libertarian Studies*.

John H. Timmerman is professor of English at Calvin College and editor of *Christianity and Literature*. His poetry, short stories, and critical essays have appeared in numerous publications. His forthcoming publications are: *Dancing on Waters*, a collection of poems (Middleburg Press), and *Frederick Manfred: A Bibliography and Publishing History*.
