

NOTES ON CONTRIBUTORS

George A. Panichas, professor of English at the University of Maryland, is associate editor of *Modern Age* and also serves as its book review and literary editor. Currently on sabbatical he is editing, with David S. Collier, 25 volumes of *Modern Age* in preparation of a work, *A Generation of the Intellectual Right: The Best of Modern Age*, to be published after the journal's silver jubilee issue this summer.

George W. Carey, professor of government at Georgetown University, editor of *The Political Science Reviewer*, and associate editor of *Modern Age*, is completing a definitive study of the impact of *The Federalist* on American political theory and practice.

Stephen J. Tonsor, professor of intellectual history at the University of Michigan, is widely regarded as a principal spokesman for American conservatism. He has been associate editor of *Modern Age* since 1969 and a contributor to this journal for more than two decades; he is now devoting his time to an extended work, *A History of the Idea of Equality*.

William F. Campbell, professor of economics at Louisiana State University, has published many articles on the relationship between politics and economics and is currently finishing a book, *The End of Political Economy*.

Tibor R. Machan is associate professor of philosophy at the State University College, Fredonia, N.Y., on leave as director of educational programs at the Reason Foundation, and visiting lecturer in economics at the University of California, Santa Barbara. He is author of numerous books and continues to serve as a widely read commentator on libertarian theory in books, journals and the news media.

Dante Germino is professor of government and foreign affairs at the University of Virginia where his specialty is political theory. His latest book, *Political Philosophy and the Open Society*, will be published by the LSU Press in early 1982 and he is on leave this year doing research in Italy.

E. C. Pasour, Jr. is professor of economics and business at North Carolina State University. His well received analyses have appeared in economic journals and, among others, in *The Intercollegiate Review*, *Reason Papers*, *The Journal of Libertarian Studies*, and *The Freeman*.

Paul Gottfried, professor of history at Rockford College and co-editor-in-chief of *Continuity*, the conservative historical journal, is the author of *Conservative Millenarians* (Fordham University Press).
