*Russell Kirk's* most recent books are *The Portable Conservative Reader* (Viking) and *Reclaiming a Patrimony* (Heritage Foundation). Dr. Kirk has been elected president of the Philadelphia Society, the association of conservative scholars and professional and business people.

*George A. Panichas*, professor of English at the University of Maryland, is associate editor of *Modern Age* and also serves as its book review and literary editor. He is currently editing 25 volumes of *Modern Age* in preparation of a work, *A Generation of the Intellectual Right: The Best of Modern Age*.

*Stephen Tonsor*, professor of intellectual history at the University of Michigan, has been associate editor of *Modern Age* since 1969 and a contributor to this journal for more than two decades. His essay is based on a Phi Alpha Theta Lecture at Hillsdale College, Spring 1983.

*Henry Regnery*, founder in 1948 of Henry Regnery Company and now president of Regnery/Gateway, Inc., Book Publishers, is author of *Memoirs of a Dissident Publisher*. He also was the founder, together with Russell Kirk and David S. Collier, of *Modern Age*.

*Harry V. Jaffa* is Henry Salvatori Research Professor of Political Philosophy at Claremont McKenna College and president of the Winston S. Churchill Association. He is the author, among other works, of *Crisis of the House Divided: An Interpretation of the Issues in the Lincoln-Douglas Debates* and *How to Think About the American Revolution*. The present essay will appear in his forthcoming book, *American Conservatism and the American Founding* (with a Foreword by William F. Buckley, Jr.).

*Forrest McDonald* is professor of American history at the University of Alabama. His most recent book is *A Constitutional History of the United States* (Franklin Watts, 1982).

*Michael Mendle*, professor of English history at the University of Alabama, is the author of *Dangerous Positions: Mixed Government, the Estates of the Realm, and the Making of the "Answer to the XIX Propositions,"* to be published by the University of Alabama Press. McDonald and Mendle are collaborating on a forthcoming book on the English origins of the American Constitution.

*Anthony Harrigan*, president of the United States Industrial Council, is the author of numerous books, including *Defense Against Total Attack* and *A Guide to the War in Vietnam*. His newspaper column is published in approximately 300 papers.

*John F. Desmond* is professor of English at Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge.

*James Murray Miclot* is professor of political science and religious studies at the University of Montana.

*A. J. Conyers* is Professor of Bible, Baptist Chair of Bible, at Central Missouri State University. His articles and book reviews have appeared in *Christianity Today*, *Christian Heritage* and *The Biblical Illustrator*.
