

## Notes on Contributors

*Thomas S. Gladsky*, associate professor of English at Central Missouri State University in Warrensburg, has published essays on John Esten Cooke, James Fenimore Cooper and William Dunlap, John Barth, Isaac Bashevis Singer, Thomas Flanagan, and others. A senior Fulbright lecturer to Poland in 1981–82, he is currently working on a book discussing the Pole in American literature.

*Russell Kirk*, perhaps the most influential American social thinker and man of letters in the last thirty years, is the author of many books, including the celebrated *The Conservative Mind*; *Eliot and His Age*; *Enemies of the Permanent Things*; *The Roots of American Order*; and *Decline and Renewal in the Higher Learning*. Kirk has been professor or visiting distinguished professor at several universities and colleges. The only American to earn a Doctor of Letters degree from St. Andrews University in Scotland, he has also been awarded many honorary degrees. Kirk has been a Guggenheim Fellow and a Senior Fellow of the American Council of Learned Societies. He is chairman of the Academic Board of the National Humanities Institute and president of two cultural foundations.

*Alfonz Lengyel* was born on October 21, 1921 in Hungary. A graduate of the Law Academy of Miskolc (1948), he was imprisoned by the Stalinist Secret Police from 1950 to September 1956. In 1956 he emigrated to the United States where he has taught in a number of universities. In 1975 he received a gold medal for outstanding American citizenship; he was also awarded a "Pro Mundi Beneficio" medal from the Academia Brasileira de Ciencias Humanas.

*Paul Norton* has political science degrees from the University of Colorado and the University of Toronto. He taught at universities in Ontario and British Columbia for eleven years and has published papers and reviews in political philosophy and jurisprudence in journals in Canada, the United States, France, and England.

*Albert Parry*, professor emeritus of Russian civilization and language, now lives in St. Petersburg, Florida, where he keeps busy writing, publishing, and guest-lecturing. Over the years his articles have appeared in *The New York Times Magazine*, *The New Yorker*, and other periodicals. Among his many books are *Tattoo*, *Whistler's Father*, and *Terrorism: From Robespierre to Arafat*.

*David Lewis Schaefer* is an associate professor of political science at Holy Cross College, Worcester, Massachusetts. His previous publications include *Justice or Tyranny?* (1979) and articles in *American Political Science Review*, *Review of Metaphysics*, *Polity*, *Interpretation*, *Journal of Politics*, and other professional journals. He is also coeditor of a forthcoming edition of *The Statesman*, by Sir Henry Taylor.

*Un-chol Shin* is an associate professor of humanities in the Department of Humanities at Eastern Kentucky University in Richmond. He is coeditor of *A Humanities Approach to Ancient Ways of Thinking: An Anthology*; his article on "Ortega's Concept of Artist" will appear in a forthcoming issue of *The Journal of Aesthetic Education*. He is a member of the Polanyi Society and the Association of Integrative Studies.
