

Notes on Contributors

Anne Husted Burleigh is a housewife, mother, and free-lance writer in Cincinnati, Ohio. She is a contributing editor and columnist for *Crisis*, a journal of lay Catholic opinion. She has been a contributor to *Modern Age* and is one of the journal's editorial advisors.

Jude P. Dougherty is Dean of the School of Philosophy, The Catholic University of America, and is editor of *The Review of Metaphysics*. He has written extensively on social and political issues.

Carl F. H. Henry is the author of 36 books and editor of a dozen others on religio-moral themes. Among his works is the six-volume tome on *God, Revelation, and Authority*. He is a resident of Arlington, Virginia.

James Hitchcock is Professor of Law in History at St. Louis University. He has published widely in both scholarly and popular journals, and his most recent book is *Years of Crisis, 1970–1983*.

Stanley L. Jaki, a Hungarian-born Catholic priest of the Benedictine Order, is Distinguished Professor at Seton Hall University, South Orange, New Jersey. A prolific author, he has served as Gifford Lecturer at the University of Edinburgh and as Fremantle Lecturer at Balliol College, Oxford. *Membre correspondant* of the Académie Nationale des Sciences, Belles-Lettres et Arts of Bordeaux, he is the recipient of the Lecomte du Noüy Prize for 1970 and of the Templeton Prize for 1987. The essay in this symposium is based on a lecture delivered at the invitation of the Academy of Sciences, U.S.S.R., in Moscow, June 18, 1989.

Russell Kirk's newest book is *The Conservative Constitution*. New editions of his books *Prospects for Conservatives* and *Lord of the Hollow Dark* have been published in recent months. He is editor of the new series The Library of Conservative Thought (Transaction Books).

Byron C. Lambert is Professor of Philosophy, retired, Fairleigh Dickinson University, Madison, New Jersey. He has edited a selection of the writings of Paul Elmer More, *The Essential Paul Elmer More*, and written articles and reviews for *Modern Age*, the *Intercollegiate Review*, the *University Bookman*, *Phaedrus*, and *Cithara*.

John Lukacs is a distinguished historian whose most recent book is a kind of memoir, entitled *Confessions of an Original Sinner* (Ticknor & Fields/Houghton Mifflin).

Thomas Molnar was born in Budapest, Hungary, on June 26, 1921. A student at the University of Brussels early in World War II, he was arrested by the Nazis for his activities in a Catholic resistance group, and imprisoned at Buchenwald and Dachau, being liberated by American troops on the day for which his execution was scheduled. His numerous publications include *The Counter-Revolution*, *God and the Knowledge of Reality*, and *Le Socialisme sans Visage*.

Ronald H. Nash is Professor of Philosophy at Western Kentucky University. The latest of his twenty books is *The Closing of the American Heart: What's Really Wrong With America's Schools*.

Gerhart Niemeyer, though now Professor Emeritus of Government, is still active as a part-time teacher at Notre Dame. He also is Canon Niemeyer at the Episcopal Cathedral of St. James in South Bend, Indiana. A book of his essays, *Aftersight and Foresight*, was published recently by the University Press of America.

James V. Schall, S.J., has been contributing to *Modern Age* since the Spring 1960 issue, when he was a Jesuit scholastic completing his doctoral dissertation on "Immortality and the Foundations of Political Theory" at Georgetown University. A member of the California Province of the Society of Jesus, he also teaches political theory at Georgetown. Among his recent books are *Liberation Theology*, *The Distinctiveness of Christianity*, and *The Politics of Heaven and Hell*.

Stephen J. Tonsor was born November 26, 1923, in Jersey Township, Illinois. He served as a cryptographer in the Army during World War II. He was educated at Blackburn College, the Universities of Zürich, Munich, and the University of Illinois. He became a professor of history and shortly thereafter identified himself as a conservative. He is married, has four children and nine grandchildren. He has found all the aspects of his life richly complementary and satisfying.

Alexander F. C. Webster is a senior research associate at the Ethics and Public Policy Center in Washington, D.C. A priest in the Romanian Episcopate of the Orthodox Church in America, he serves as pastor of St. Mary Orthodox Church in Falls Church, Virginia. He is also adjunct professor in theology at Virginia Theological Seminary (Episcopal).
