

Notes on Contributors

Mark Christhill, a poet and critic who teaches English at Eastern Illinois University in Charleston, Illinois, is the author of a book on *W. S. Merwin the Mythmaker*. He is a regular contributor to the pages of *Modern Age*.

Paul Hollander is Professor of Sociology at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst and Fellow of the Russian Research Center at Harvard University. He attended high school in his native Hungary, college at the London School of Economics, and graduate school at Princeton University. He is the author of *Soviet and American Society*, *Political Pilgrims*, *The Many Faces of Socialism*, *The Survival of the Adversary Culture*, and the forthcoming *Anti-Americanism: Critiques at Home and Abroad 1965-1990*.

Vladislav Krasnov is Professor and Director of Russian Studies at the Monterey Institute of International Studies. He is the author of *Solzhenitsyn and Dostoevsky*, *Soviet Defectors: The KGB Wanted List*, and *Beyond Communism: A New Russia*.

Franz Michael is Professor Emeritus at George Washington University, Washington, D.C. He was formerly Assistant Director and Acting Director of the Far Eastern and Russian Institute, University of Washington, Seattle; Director of the Institute for Sino-Soviet Studies, George Washington University; and Chairman of the Modern Chinese History Project at both universities. He is the author of *The Taiping Rebellion* (3 volumes), *The Origin of Manchu Rule in China*, *China Through the Ages*, and approximately twenty other books on Mainland China and East Asia, as well as innumerable articles.

Thomas Molnar was born in Budapest, Hungary, on June 26, 1921. A student at the University of Brussels early in World War II, he was arrested by the Nazis for his activities in a Catholic resistance group and imprisoned at Buchenwald and Dachau, being liberated by American troops on the day for which his execution was scheduled. His numerous publications include *The Counter-Revolution*, *God and the Knowledge of Reality*, and *Le Socialisme sans Visage*.

Gerhart Niemeyer, though now Professor Emeritus of Government, is still active as a part-time teacher at Notre Dame. He also is Canon Niemeyer at the Episcopal Cathedral of St. James in South Bend, Indiana. A book of his essays, *Aftersight and Foresight*, was recently published by the University Press of America and the Intercollegiate Studies Institute.

Ellis Sandoz is Professor of Political Science at Louisiana State University and former Chairman of the Department. He now serves as Director of the Eric Voegelin Institute for American Renaissance Studies at LSU, established in 1987. A native of Louisiana whose family first came there from Switzerland in 1829, he is a U. S. Marine Corps veteran (1953-1956). He was educated at LSU, the universities of North Carolina, Georgetown, Heidelberg, and the University of Munich, where he completed his doctorate with Eric Voegelin in 1965, the only American ever to do so.

Ewa M. Thompson, Professor and Chairman of the Department of German and Slavic Studies at Rice University, was born in Kaunas, Lithuania. After being awarded a B.A. from the University of Warsaw and an M.F.A. from the Sopot Conservatory of Music, she received a Ph.D. in Comparative Literature from Vanderbilt University in 1967. The author of several books and numerous articles, she has recently completed a volume on *Understanding Russia: The Holy Fool in Russian Culture*.

Stephen J. Tonsor was born on November 26, 1923, in Jersey Township, Illinois. He served as a cryptographer in the Army during World War II. He was educated at Blackburn College, the Universities of Zürich, Munich, and the University of Illinois. He became a professor of history and shortly thereafter identified himself as a conservative. He is married, has four children and nine grandchildren. He has found all the aspects of his life richly complementary and satisfying.
