

Notes on Contributors

George W. Carey is Professor of Government, Georgetown University, editor of *The Political Science Reviewer*, and longtime Associate Editor of *Modern Age*.

Michael D. Clark is Professor of History at the University of New Orleans. He is the author of *Worldly Theologians: The Persistence of Religion in Nineteenth-Century American Thought* and *Coherent Variety: The Idea of Diversity in British and American Conservative Thought*. He is currently at work on a study of the idea of tradition in American thought, 1880-1930.

James S. Cutsinger is Professor of Theology and Religious Thought at the University of South Carolina and Scholar-in-Residence at the Rose Hill House of Studies. He is the author of *The Form of Transformed Vision: Coleridge and the Knowledge of God* and Secretary to the Foundation for Traditional Studies.

Milton Hindus, Emeritus Professor of Literature at Brandeis University, is the author of a new book, *Irving Babbitt, Literature and the Democratic Culture*, published by Transaction.

Owen A. Jones, an Editorial Advisor to *Modern Age*, is Executive Director of the Rose Hill House of Studies, a retreat and conference center for traditional Christians in Aiken, South Carolina.

Thomas Molnar now teaches philosophy of religion at the University of Budapest. His recent books are *The Emerging Atlantic Culture* and *L'Hégémonie libérale*. Several of his works have appeared in Hungarian.

Marion Montgomery's "Tradition and Intellect" is the opening chapter of his *History and the Mystery of Nature: The Struggle to Get Here from There*. The whole explores a divergence among the Agrarians, particularly that between John Crowe Ransom and Allen Tate.

Gerhart Niemeyer was born in Essen, Germany, and studied at Munich and Cambridge universities; he was awarded the J.U.D. degree (doctor of both Civil and Canon Law) from Kiel University in 1939. Now Professor Emeritus of Government at the University of Notre Dame, his academic career has also included teaching at Princeton, Madrid, and Oglethorpe universities. In 1981 he was ordained as an Episcopal priest. He is the author of numerous works, among them *Law without Force*, *Between Nothingness and Paradise*, and *Deceitful Peace*.

Joseph L. Pappin III is the author of *The Metaphysics of Edmund Burke*, Fordham University Press, 1993, with a Foreword by Francis Canavan, S. J. He is Professor and Chairman of the Department of Philosophy and Religious Studies at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock.

Josef Pieper, born in 1904, was schooled in the Greek classics and the writings of Thomas Aquinas. He also studied philosophy, law, and sociology, and has served as one of the most distinguished members of the faculty at the University of Münster since 1946.

Stephen J. Tonsor, born in 1923, is Professor Emeritus of History at the University of Michigan and an Associate Editor of *Modern Age*. He focuses on European intellectual history and historiography and is the author of important studies on education, conservatism, neo-conservatism, national socialism, and the idea of equality. He was educated at Blackburn College in Carlinville, Illinois, the University of Zurich, and the University of Illinois. He has received numerous prizes and awards, including an honorary D.Litt. from Blackburn College in 1972.

David Walsh is Professor and Chair of the Department of Politics at The Catholic University of America. His books include *The Mysticism of Innerworldly Fulfillment: A Study of Jacob Boehme* and *After Ideology: Recovering the Spiritual Foundations of Freedom*. He is presently completing a study of the contemporary and historical debates at the core of the liberal tradition, from which his essay is excerpted, and wishes to acknowledge the support of the Bradley and Earhart Foundations for the period when this essay was in preparation.
