

## Notes on Contributors

*C. N. Abromaitis*, a native Baltimorean, has taught English at Loyola College in Maryland for over thirty-two years. She received her doctorate in English from the University of Maryland, specializing in Restoration and Eighteenth-Century English literature. Among the writers she has published and lectured on are Alexander Pope, Gerard Manley Hopkins, J. R. R. Tolkien, Madeleine L'Engle, and C. S. Lewis.

*Virginia Arbery*, Ph.D., teaches in the Humanities Program at Saint Anselm College in New Hampshire. Previously she was on the faculty and Dean of Admissions at Thomas More College in Merrimack, New Hampshire. She is Consultant to The National Center for America's Founding Documents, Boston University. A Richard Weaver Fellow, she has lectured widely on liberal education and has published both on American politics and literature.

*Stephen M. Fields*, S.J., is currently Assistant Professor of Theology in Georgetown University, Washington, D.C. He holds an M.A. from Oxford and a Ph.D. in the philosophy of religion from Yale. He has also published in Philosophy and Theology.

*Carl Guldager*, an honors graduate of Northwestern University, became a sports writer, reporter, and columnist for *The Chicago Daily News*. Subsequently he served as a publicist for The University of Chicago and as an advertising executive for Marshall Field & Company. His writings have appeared in *The Saturday Evening Post*, *American* magazine, and *Town and Country*, among others. At present he is a marketing consultant, freelance writer, and editor.

*Vigen Guroian*, who teaches theology and ethics at Loyola College in Maryland, has published widely in such journals as *Thought*, *Cross Currents*, *Union Seminary Quarterly Review*, *Journal of Ecumenical Studies*, and *The Greek Orthodox Theological Review*.

*Thomas Howard* has taught English at Kingsmead School, Hoylake, Cheshire, England, from 1961-63; at St. Bernard's School, New York, from 1967-1970; and at Gordon College, Wenham, Massachusetts, from 1970-1985. Since 1985, he has taught English at St. John's Seminary College, Brighton, Massachusetts. Besides courses in the history of English literature, he regularly teaches courses in the works of C. S. Lewis, and of the twentieth-century Roman Catholic writers, J. R. R. Tolkien, Evelyn Waugh, Graham Greene, Flannery O'Connor, and Walker Percy. He is the author of many books, articles, and reviews.

*Peter Kreeft* teaches in the Department of Philosophy at Boston College. He has written many books, including *C. S. Lewis: A Critical Essay* (1969), *The Shadowlands of C. S. Lewis* (1994), and *C. S. Lewis for the Third Millennium* (1994).

*Thomas Molnar* now teaches philosophy of religion at the University of Budapest. His recent books are *The Emerging Atlantic Culture* and *L'Hégémonie libérale*. Several of his works have appeared in Hungarian.
